ROSE MASK





I turned this artistic rendering of a flower into a mask (1). A maquette was constructed of Fosshape 300 to find the general shapes (2). Starting with a dolly head encased in foil and Fosshape 600 I constructed a skull cap. To activate the Fosshape I used a combination of steam and mini irons. Using the steam first in shaping gave me more flexibility and once it was in a shape I liked the mini irons to smooth and finalize the shape. To sides of the skull cap I added an strip and then a swirl for the center of the rose. Both of these additional pieces were stitched in place before final activation of the Fosshape (3). The skull cap had to be shortened along the sides and front so that it would slide on and off the head without requiring an additional opening (4).


















The back petal was attached last.
It is extra long at the base so it rests against the neck and shoulders providing support to the mask. The mask is worn on a slight forward slant in order to provide a better visual and to limit imparirment of speach.

To allow access into the petals the back hinges on the right side and attached to the other with elastic hooks to keep the tension.

Start to finish this project took 40 hours.



The exterior rows of petals were constructed from Fosshape that was formed around metal bowls (6). The interior is a solid bowl shape that looks like 3 petals. Solid construction provided stability around the neck and worked to support the outer 4 petals which were shaped separately before being attached. A fabric mâché technique was used to replicate the painted look of the research image. I used Sculpt or Coat to mâché 3 different fabrics to the mask (7). Using different shades and types of fabric allowed for a variation in color to provide depth to the flower (8). There are two layers of mâché on the rose. The first layer is a dark red in areas of that would be in shadow and a lighter red along the edges. The second layer is red chiffon to mull everything (9).
